




















Manager Comments of the Comment of t

he traditional last-minute scramble for qualifying places at the *World Grand Prix* added some extra drama to the already enjoyable European Tour this month.

Whilst it was Chizzyand Cool Hand Luke Humphries who grabbed the headlines, Luke Woodhouse, Gian Van Veen and Jermaine Wattimena embarked valiant efforts to make the field for the first of the Autumn ranking majors.

Indeed, since our mid-summer Darts World Extra the tungsten world has barely missed a beat. The Pro Tour has held multiple blocks of Players Championships. The PDC Youth World Championship was played from 64 to 2! The Women's Series has played another four competitions and left only one more batch for the 2023 season.

Meanwhile, the European Tour returned from its early summer hiatus to bring two superb events and The World Series of Darts played out its annual finals in the Netherlands.

The WDF may have had a few hiccups closer to home, but the affiliated nations are remarkably busy around the globe and plenty of ranking activity has been going on in Australia, North America and as usual across mainland Europe. Confirmation of Lakeside details will also prove a boost to players and supporters alike.

The UKDA are off and running with their third season with Lancashire starting their defence strongly but there is a long way to go as the teams prepare for their second weekend of National league fixtures as you read these words.

Darts World has also juggled its timetables due to severe illness at the DW Bunker and has moved the publication of the Autumn Issue (584) until the cusp of October/November where it will be packed with original content, news, reviews and interviews.



atthew Porter seems to have developed something of a knack recently. Both of his most recent in person interviews involved delivering unpopular decisions or tackling controversial issues and both were done in such a way as to imply that there was really no debate to be had.

The Matchroom Multi Sport chairman even went as far as suggesting that those opposed to trans players in the Women's Series and World Matchplay, dislike the format of the Premier League or more opportunity, especially for youth players and women, across codes were narrow minded or keyboard warriors.

Never mind the fact that the best female player currently playing will be forced to choose whether to defend her Women's world title or accept the places

she has earned in PDC men's event where she is less likely to progress or add to her roll of titles. A similar situation will surround Luke Littler who has already qualified for the next 'Lakeside'.

As with the debate surrounding male bodies being permitted in women's sport, the



habit of some is to belittle the views of those opposed and to try to close out debate or marginalised certain beliefs.

However, such views are mainstream, quite possibly the majority, and the momentum is with the re-establishment of an exclusive womens category and trans participants competing in a specialist or 'open' category. Cycling, swimming,

athletics and others have already moved clearly and decisively in this direction. Are these sports, participants, their fans and governing bodies narrow minded?

The idea that more than one world champion is necessarily bad for the game does not stack up at

all. For more than 30 years our game has had at least two claimants for that

crown. It created rivalries, news stories, TV documentaries and motivation. You only have to look at the sport PDC Chairman Eddie Hearn thrives in to see that multiple codes, formats and champions are really nothing unusual.

As CEO of the PDC perhaps we might prevail upon Mr Porter for a modicum of respect for perfectly reasonable and honestly held views.

HUMPHRIES GOES THE HARD WAY

NO HAND OUTS FOR COOL HAND

"I need to give credit to myself because I really battled hard today. If that dart at double 12 had gone in, this probably would have been one of the greatest games I've ever played."

N sport you often hear about who might be the best player never to win a 'major' event or debates as to who will be the next to break their duck. At various times in their careers Andy Murray, Goran Ivanesevic and Ben Crenshaw looked as if they would not make that final step. All did!

In very few sports is it possible for a player who has not claimed such a title to sit in the rarefied atmosphere of their sport's top 10 or even top 5! Luke Humphries however can claim just that.

No short cuts or quick fixes for the man known as 'Cool Hand' after failing to claim the Uk Open in his first major final a few years back The Hastings man seems determined to reach the pinnacle of his chosen profession by the longest and most difficult route imaginable.

Take for example his most recent effort: Playing through a confirmed back spasm, the Red Dragon darts star pulled off a perfect leg and 2x 170 checkouts on the Final day of action in the 2023 Hungarian Darts Trophy. Yet still, the World Number 6 fell just short losing a last leg decider to an impressive display from Dave Chisnall.





The former UK Open Finalist achieved perfection in the 12th leg after hitting double 12 to complete a 141 finish, making it back-to-back 9 darters in the last two PDC tournaments with Michael van Gerwen achieving the same feat at the World Series of



Darts Finals last weekend.

"I had the 170, the nine-darter. I gave it everything and although tiredness was creeping in, I still put up a great fight with five ton-plus averages this weekend. I just could not shake Chizzy off. What a player he is. If he finds this form on a TV stage, he will win one and he's a player that deserves to win one." Cool Hand Luke had put down a statement performance on Saturday at the MVM Dome, averaging 108+ in beating Irish youngster Keane Barry 6-2 in the Second Round.

The Englishman continued from where he left off in his opening match of the day, dropping just one leg in beating Martin Schindler 6-1 with an average of 106.17 having missed just 2 darts on the outer ring.

Humphries continues to show the evidence of the drastic improvement in his doubling, missing just 7 darts at double in his opening 2 matches of the Hungarian Darts Trophy to reach the Quarter Finals.

The Red Dragon ended a crucial run from Luke Woodhouse in the Quarter Finals, with Woody qualifying for the 2023 World Grand Prix on the Pro Tour Order of Merit despite defeat. Luke claimed victory without reply from his opponent, again averaging 100+ with 4 180s and 9 140s in Budapest.

The Newbury born player achieved his first big fish on Sunday against former World Champion Gerwyn Price, who was in the hunt for a 3rd Euro Tour title this year. A combined 28 140s were thrown over the 11 legs played in the Semi Final, with Luke prevailing a 7-4 winner including a 103.10 average.

The Iceman found an early break of throw in the contest but fell just short at the MVM Dome, having found a 100% doubling rate earlier in the day to knock out defending

champion Joe Cullen with a 6-4 victory.

Humphries went on to hit a 100+ average in every single match of his Hungarian Darts Trophy, scoring 100.97 despite an 8-7 defeat whilst also including a perfect 9 dart leg and a 170 checkout.



Cool Hand Luke broke throw instantly after hitting the bull to complete the big fish, whilst also recorded a 63.64% finishing rate in an epic Hungarian Darts Trophy Final between 2 top scorers in the game today.

Dave Chisnall was the better player in the Final, hitting a 104.82 average whilst also including 7 180s to Luke's 4 in Budapest.





Chizzy became the first player in 2023 to win 3 PDC Euro Tour crowns, with one more tournament left to play this year in Hildesheim.

"If you had told me this morning that I would have got to the final I wouldn't have believed you. I need to give credit to myself because I really battled hard today. If that dart at double 12 had gone in, this probably would have been one of the greatest games I've ever played."

So could Luke emulate Andy Murray and claim a major after several valiant efforts, might he come through and claim one

emphatically like Crenshaw. Or could he end, like Colin Montgomerie, as the best player, and most popular, never to win one of the games most coveted titles?

There is another possibility, Colin Lloyd became world number one, ahead of Phil Taylor, by playing every event and picking up every available point regardless of the level. He went on to claim several major crowns including a magnificent World Matchplay with a 170 finish to claim the title.

Maybe Cool Hand is plotting such a triumphant ascendance, perhaps a double start would add a little extra something?





Bullseyes & Bounce-Outs!

Our regular lighthearted look at who's hot, and who's not, in world darts. Small incidents can have big consequences. Players and even companies and codes come from nowhere, suddenly move up a level or even dramatically collapse. The signs were there if you'd known where to look.



Dave Chisnall: *Chizzy* really does seem to have found his metier in the European Tour formula. His supreme scoring skills flourish over shortish but not cut throat formats. There is a good crowd and atmosphere but not quite the extreme pressure of major TV ranking finals.

Luke Woodhouse: The Bewdley thrower has been on the fringes of the top level for close to a decade. Despite threatening to break through on occasion, a 9-darter in the home tour for example, he must have been wondering if that breakthrough would come. **Woody's** qualification for the World Grand Prix and strong performances this year have put that to bed and he has earned his chance at the main events. Harrows must be delighted.

Mikuriu Suzuki: The Japanese double Lakeside champion looked to be slipping in the early days of the Women's Series. Covid and her huge travel burden seemed to be too much.But, in a turnaround that must be good for the game, *The Miracle* is right back in the top echelon and is likely to claim qualifying places at the Grand slam and world Championships once again.

Anastasia Dobromyslova: Another much-welcomed return is that of another former multiple Word Champion. A previous loss of form and then the current difficulties associated with her Russian heritage, seemed to have dulled this remarkable champion. Recent performances, especially at the PDC Womens Series suggest we have yet to see the last of this historic talent.

Krzysztof Ratajski: *The Polish Eagle* had seemed to have stalled in mid air in recent months. The Pole – a winner of the Gibraltar Darts Trophy in 2019 – ended his four-year wait for a big stage crown with a series of superb performances at the Sparkassen-Arena to claim the German Darts Open earlier this month.



Bounce-Outs!

Neil Duff: The WDF World Champion seems to be going through the mill. After a promising post Lakeside start he is struggling to carry the burden in almost every format and code. Players in the MSS get a longer look at him, and are determined to KO a world champion and Seniors veterans have a great deal to bring to the table. Either way *The Duff Man* needs to recapture that swagger and confidence before defending his title in December.

Alan Soutar: The popular Scotsman seems to have drifted after an excellent spell. Recent months have seen early knockouts for *Soots* in Pro Tour events and less of his usual gritty runs. The Arbroath man needs to right the ship if he is to establish himself in that top 32 and then look to go higher.

Adrian Lewis: A Literal bounceout from *Jackpot* as he steps away from the daily grind of the professional game after 20 years in the very top segment. Tiredness, family illness, and much more, lie behind the decision but the Stoke-on-Trent man is getting fit and looking well after the first few months. Assuming he can find a way to combine his optimal wellbeing with a return, many will welcome him with open arms.

64-128: It's going to be tougher in future for those new to the PDC circuit or the journeymen players who fill the lower half of the exclusive club of 128 tour card holders. From the 2024 season all the Pro Tour (Players Championship and qualifying) events are scheduled for midweek. This will require players to be full time professionals or have very flexible working arrangements. Many doubt that there is enough money in the PDC game to justify 64-128 being full time. Currently the 128th player has earned less than £9,000 in almost two years!

WDF Players: The period of goodwill to all dart players is over. Last year's exceptional circumstance waivers, that gave multiple players the chance to play both Lakeside and Ally Pally, are not going to be re issued and the PDC have severely tightened their criteria going forward. Not only will the higher end players be excluded but so to youth and ladies players alike. Big decisions to be made for the likes of **Beau Greaves** and **Luke Littler**.

of Dutch darts looks very good! Jonny Clayton knocked-out the third German in a row in Martin Schindler then, before we had the all Dutch clash between Danny Noppert and Dirk van Duijvenbode.

The crowd seemed to choose the side of 'aubergenius' and there were even fans throwing an aubergine on the stage! That didn't help though as Noppert beat Van Duijvenbode 6-4 with both Dutchmen averaging well over a ton!

The player most people were looking forward to though was five time world champion Raymond van Barneveld! The Barney Army was louder than I've ever heard which was incredibly impressive and all Barney's grandchildren were there to support him. The support helped Barney to get over the line in a tough game against Canada's Jeff Smith.

Ricky Evans then won the game dubbed 'battle of the walk-ons' in a last leg decider over Damon Heta.

Saturday evening promised to have an even bigger crowd although I must say they did behave better than on Friday. Less booing, standing on tables and throwing stuff and more singing, cheering and drinking rather than throwing the drinks.

Most of the seeds safely came through their opener, including Dutch number one



Michael van Gerwen who beat an inspired William O'Connor thanks to the support of the crowd by 6-4.

The biggest shock of the night came by the hands of Keegan Brown though as some absolutely unreal finishing saw him remove defending champion Gerwyn Price to the surprise of the crowd, fans at home and even himself!

Barney returned to take on World Champion Michael Smith and the Barney Army once again made a lot of noise, supporting their legend which indeed literally gave me goosebumps. The Dutch legend once again came through a close game and he beat World Champion Smith 6-4 to reach the quarter-finals!

Danny Noppert couldn't reproduce this though as he lost to Nathan Aspinall. The crowd didn't support hThe Freeze enough, although in my opinion he did not do much to have the crowd supporting him either.

The night was ended by Peter Wright throwing awful but escaping against Puha and Dimitri van den Bergh demolishing a disapointing Ricky Evans 6-1.

Sunday saw the first quarter-finalist, Luke Humphries, absolutely destroy top seed Rob Cross 10-2, Michael van Gerwen edged out Dimitri van den Bergh 10-8 to the delight of the Dutch crowd and the disgust of some Belgian fans in the house.

Nathan Aspinall then saw off Keegan Brown before Barney took on Peter Wright. The Barney Army was happy to see their hero lead 6-3 but Van Barneveld could not get going after the second break as Snakebite won 7 legs on the spin for a 10-6 victory.

For the Sunday evening session we were back at the walk-on, having been in the middle of the crowd for the 2 sessions prior to the final one. The middle of the crowd was nice too though as I've met English, German and Belgian fans as well.

The English fans were especially surprised about how fast it went to get a drink here: instead of missing an entire game they only missed 2 legs!

Back to the darts, the first semifinal was a classic! MVG hit the perfect leg, a first in the history of this tournament, but half of the crowd missed it because of a scoreboard error! Despite that perfect leg, MVG did have to survive multiple matchdarts from Luke Humphries, but 'Cool Hand' missed and Mighty Mike punished him ti claim the game 11-10!

The other semifinal Aspinall took an early lead over Wright, the Scotsman threatened a comeback only to be denied 9-11!

In the final the Asp ran out of energy,the Matchplay Champion could not get going at all. Dutch number one Van Gerwen won the final 11-4 and picked up a 5th WS Finals title in front of his family and the Dutch fans!

It was another successful edition of the World Series Finals, with a deserved Dutch winner, some brilliant darts, some rubbish darts, some absolute shocks and some legends coming back to form!

Onto the next one, and I will be there again, in one role or another.




MEDIA MATTERS

Hot off the press?

In 1992, after John Major's Conservatives pulled off a surprise victory over Labour in the general election, Murdoch's flagship tabloid *The Sun* declared that it was it which had 'won it'. Nowadays, with newspapers in declining circulation and increasingly challenged by other forms of media, one suspects such a headline would not occur again.

Despite this, the cultural sway of our nation's newspapers remains large. And over the past few months, where darts fits into this has been on my mind.

In the last few months, I have interviewed two journalists from Britain's

big-hitting broadsheet newspapers, both of whom reflected on this issue of coverage. Jonathan Liew of *The Guardian* was perhaps a little stronger in his critique of the industry's failure to cover sports such as darts well, whilst *The Times's* Elgan Alderman highlighted the sheer breadth of sports the mainstream media has to contend with.

It is also not a problem unique to Britain. I was recently chatting to a journalist on an esteemed German paper, who expressed his frustration at the difficulty to get darts column inches despite its proven popularity on his organisation's website.

(Editor's note: The recent expansion of darts coverage in the Daily Star should be noted A regular column from James Wade a reasonably frequent steam of darts stories seem to fit with the pap's target demographic)

Darts is one of several sports



which suffers from a bit of a World Championship problem, where so much of its mainstream exposure seems to be restricted to those feted 16 days over Christmas.

This isn't a bad thing, and much rather we would have a period where darts pulls its weight confidently amongst other sports than have its marquee event fail to make an impact. But it certainly limits the sport's outreach in other months.

That being said, how much does it matter? This is not an issue which keeps anyone at the PDC awake at night and there are plenty of other barometers of exposure which no doubt reassures them that the game is continuing to grow.

Perhaps, as Rupert Murdoch's semiretirement has led some to consider, it is time to reassess the domain of the written press in this country and the wider world for good.

THE ART OF DARTS COACHING



PLAYERS PERSPECTIVE

ver the years we have seen the idea of a former professional darts player taking up a role as a darts coach. The likes of Wayne Mardle, Eric Bristow, Keith Deller, and Paul Nicholson are among the few to become coaches, using the experience they gained to help others in improving as potential players.

Nicholson has established himself in the world of Darts having won a PDC Players Championship Finals crown back in 2010 as well as reaching a World Cup of Darts Final with Simon Whitlock in 2012.

The Asset has now become one of the leading figures in darts media as well as being a coach, with the role / profession becoming more accepted within darts players now.

Motivation is a key aspect of being a darts coach, and different ways

of inspiration work with different players. Nicholson also spoke out on how it's important too not just give a player what they want:

"To motivate someone you have to not just give them what they want but you have to be able to surprise them. The ability to show someone that they can do something quite extraordinary without making massive changes, that's the skill of a coach in any sport."

"You might get a golf coach that makes a tiny tweak to a stance or a playing of a golf club, and you get to a EUREKA moment of I can do that. That's inspirational but you have to be receptive to every single level of player, this is not just for pros or semi pros, it's for people who are playing in their local leagues and those who want to get better."

"To give them that, it's motivational not just for me but for the person involved. My

motivation when I meet someone for the first time is that I want to give them something like that in their first session, it instilled the belief in them that they can improve with coaching."

Paul has worked with some of the game's best including Luke Humphries, who saw a

breakthrough year in 2022 having claimed 4 Euro Tours to

become Number 1 on the PDC European Tour Order of Merit.

"Luke Humphries came out and said he had spent a bit of time with me and the amount of people who got in touch to have a session after was ridiculous".

Nicholson went on to say the role of a darts coach will continue to grow in the next few years, as many players in the game today continue to benefit from coaching from elite specialists.

"We are in its infancy, with the JDC (Junior Darts Circuit) qualification to become a coach now we're becoming more popular, and people are starting to understand that it works. One of the great things about people like me being able to do it, is the ability to communicate with a lot of people whether its darts shops/ manufacturers

and people spreading the word, that's important."

"If we can do the right things like coaching in safe spaces with the right amount of safeguarding for young people and doing

everything right from the off, that's very important. Moving forward I see this becoming the same as golf coaching where you go down to,your local club and say you want a lesson and there will be someone qualified there to do so."

> "We don't have enough darts coaches at the minute, but I see in 10 years us having a lot more with people communicating the right language. The language is still a bit old school with a little smattering of what needs to happen and that is changing sizeably at the

minute."

It's not just major title winning players like The Asset who can help shape players as they develop.

Much as in football, with super coaches such as Jose Mourinho having only played at lower levels, knowledge, thoughtfulness and teaching ability are vital.

Nathan Warren is a current player who has been involved in darts as a player and coach, including a star performance when he played with BRSA Wanderers.

"We look at using the individual skills and abilities they've got and their own philosophies, so again we don't try and teach new philosophies, we do try and open a coach's mind. You see certain things on the internet where I do it this way so everyone should do it this way, we try to make coaches aware of the different sort of throws, stances, and techniques."

"You use this to build on what the athlete has already, rather than trying to produce robots to give these skills that the coaches can take away and adapt to their own environment."

Warren was involved in ADC action, entering a few tournaments organised by the Chichester Darts Series. The Englishman has included some top coaching moments over the years, bringing the future up and coming talents to the next level.

"Within darts, it's taking beginners/ people who play at a certain level and pushing them to the next level. So for example, Super League players I've worked with, who have come to me, had slight technical flaws so we've worked with them and improved their performances."

"I've worked with beginners, from missing the board to hitting the board is an achievement for them, so again it's not just one main thing but seeing the progression in individuals. I always watch individuals, give feedback, and move forward that way so any time someone improves, it's an achievement for me."

"It's those little gains it's not about redeveloping and redesigning a game, how we play and throw darts, it's about those small percentages and improvements, which can make the difference from playing pub darts to county darts, to semi-professional and then all the way to the top."

Former Division 2 Champion Warren, continues to coach many people who want to get involved with the game, including methods of motivation and inspiration for beginners/ aspiring darts players.

"We look at Level 1 development of coaching, setting realistic targets and goals for the individuals, not setting them up to fail. We give them achievable aims in small chunks, like a simple goal such as getting three darts on a dartboard, getting three darts in 20 all the way up to three darts in the treble 20 consistently."

"It could also be getting the stance right and getting the same position time and time again just to make sure you're getting the

right things there. Giving positive feedback, encouragement and engagement is always a good one, as there's no point going to a coach who's going to be negative, but some people thrive on that."

The MSS's inaugural Champion Conan Whitehead will return to champions Week after claiming his spot by winning week one of the latest phase. *The Barbarian* is back!

The first Scandinavian qualifier Anton Ostlund was victorious and crowned the winner of Week Five at the Modus Super Series, after defeating Ryan Harrington in

the final to secure a place in Champions Week and winning the weekly £5,000 top prize.

Anton will be joined by another scandi star as Andreas Harrysson was the winner of Week Seven after defeating Kevin Painter in the final to secure his place.

Dirty Harry had been strong all week having qualified on Wednesday and never looking like missing out.


Another name that will be unknown to most is Rob Grundy. The Englishman won week six over a high quality and form filled group including Berry van Peer and Robert Thornton.

BIG BRANDS POSITION THEMSELVES FOR PEAK SEASON


T's That time of year again. The biggest names in darts jockey for position as they start the launch seasons for their new products and as they seek to bolster their playing staff:

Dobby seems to be indicative of the Aspinall and Van Den Bergh type of signings as they seem to be trying to dominate the middle generation of the three clearly defined groups available.

Michael Smith's move to Shot indicates that the New Zealand brand will expand both their general brand presence but also their sales and distribution network across Europe and UK in the coming months and years.

Finally congratulations to Harrows darts. The venerable UK brand celebrated 50 years in the business this week and from one bullseye hitter to another we tilt our hat to them. We should also note the success of their stripped down but well supported team of players. With Luke Woodhouse finally reaching his potential Harrows are batting 3 for 3 and gaining maximum value for their efforts.

More brands will have joined target and harrows by launching new products in the next few weeks. Darts World's The Boardroom will take a fuller look, and see who has made their mark, in our later Autumn editions.

ladies 'B' award with a fantastic 28.36 average.





Keeping concentrated and motivated mindset during each training session, is the key to progress. It should never be about just "going through routines". A player needs a certain attitude and commitment to MAKE IT COUNT for him! When I plan darts training, I like to think about analogy to video games – what makes people motivated to spend so much time mastering any game? How they are able to sit in front of the monitor for hours and hours, pressing buttons with flushed faces and eyes wide open with astonishment and anticipation?

(Hey, I did that too, back in a day!)... and this is what I am looking for in darts training as well – there is no place for "flat" throwing and "doing hours". Each training should bring at least some part of the excitement that everyone of us had, once we were starting out our darting journey.

GoDartsPro is doing great job for all of us here!

From all skills required from any darter, I treat 2-3 darts finishes as a most crucial one. If I were to pick one and only one skill to train on the board, that would be it.

Some time ago I created GoDartsPro playlist called "Darters Power" which is dedicated to this subject. I put "Five Checkouts" "Checkout Challenge" and "Catch 40" on the list. They are all great games that will make any devoted player deadly on their finishes.

In Checkout Randomizer I tried to include the best parts of other finishing games and add some gamification flavors to it. You will play the game at your own pace – when you are successful, you will be reaching higher tiers with greater rewards (and greater challenges) available, or – when you miss – you are going down the ladder (or even eventually loosing some points if you are not effective enough!). How many points can you reach in given time? Or how long would it take for you today to get 10 or 30 points? Give it a try and MAKE IT COUNT!"

Rules: Checkout Randomizer

The game starts with a random number from the Tier 1. If you finish it within three darts, you get one point and another random number – this time from Tier 2 etc. Anytime the out is missed you go down one tier. If you miss a checkout at Tier 1 you will also lose one point.

You can select the duration of the game to play until 30 points, 20 minutes etc. Play the game by the easy user interface or by using your Scolia device to autotrack the darts for you.

Saved by bull

To make every dart count in this game, if you are not on a double with one dart left, you can try to hit bullseye to "save" the Tier.

If you hit bullseye you will continue on the same Tier and checkout for your next throw.

Easy mode

After the first sneak-launch I got feedback from several members saying it was a great game but a bit too hard.

So I added an easy mode and if you select this option your points will never be reduced.

So even if you have some points and are back at Tier 1 and miss the checkout, your points remain safe.

Conclusion

I think this is a fantastic game that have many levels of gamification that will make it last and continue to be fun and challenging for many players.

he Winmau Maverick's are a hybrid of many classic designs, and as a result are a truly timeless dart with a potentially universal appeal.

A release that bears close resemblance to the darts of former World Champion Christian Kist, which seems appropriate with CK heading back to something like his best in recent weeks.

What's in the box

STEELTIP

SOFTIP

In the box is a set of Winmau Maverick flights, as well as the new Winmau Pro Force stems. A 32mm plain black point comes as standard, though due to the shape of the barrel, I would strongly recommend a longer point before getting to grips with the darts for the first time.



The darts are available in 21g to 25g, and are 48.3mm in length – relatively short for a modern barrel dart. The width varies by weight, with the 21g measuring at 6.75mm, while the 25g are 7.5mm at their widest point.

The barrel seems to have something in a classic dart – the recently re-released V-Wing. The front of the barrel is considerably thicker than the rear, allowing multiple different styles of grip.

The thinner rear means the taper can be used to push against, generating more power without putting unnecessary force on your throw. The thicker front means the first dart can be used as a marker to guide successive darts into their intended target.

A deceptive looking dart – there's really not too much in the way of grip. With a very shallow ring grip, as well as wide grooves and thin rings, the Maverick's remind me in style of the Purist grip seen on older Unicorn darts, just substantially less aggressive.

Debbie downers

A downside to these darts is that there is less 'feel' than with some modern milled and coated darts. The basic points also seem a little short for an ideal combination. This can be easily rectified with any decent point of 32mm or more and a swift change. It can also be done at the point of purchase via the Red Dragon website



Price and value

The Maverick's are an 80% dart, and as such are priced accordingly at £29.95 - great value for a modern tungsten dart! Despite this, when compared to a 90% tungsten dart, they feel less dense- it's a very strange one to describe and is preferred by some players who will not go higher than 85%.

Snapshot

All in all, a solid bargain in a world of overpriced tungsten, and a fantastic dart for a casual player, or a player just starting out and looking to experiment with different barrel shapes. While, especially with the points, I'd highly recommend altering the setup to suit your style of throw, they'll be a solid dart right out of the box, and one that won't break the bank!

In addition, the array of players to reach the later stages and or defeat the star names bodes well for future events as we have seen this throughout this season.

A welcome return to form for one of the game's true greats was welcomed by all but the hardest of hearts.



Wins for Mikuru Suzuki and Lisa Ashton in Saturday's opening double-header, were matched by Greaves and Sherrock who celebrated victory in Sunday's Events 19-20, as each of the top four on the Women's Series Order of Merit tasted victory.

World No.1, Greaves was beaten in back-to-back Women's Series events for just the second time in 2023 on Saturday, although normal service was resumed when she scooped the Event 19 title on Sunday afternoon.

The reigning WDF Lakeside Champion - who will soon have to decide whether to defend her title - defeated Anastasia Dobromyslova 5-2 to clinch her record-extending 20th PDC Women's Series crown, averaging 94 to cap off an impressive display.

Dobromyslova a finalist from Saturday, meanwhile, continued her resurgence to reach a second consecutive Women's Series final, edging out Priscilla Steenbergen and whitewashing Katie Sheldon to reach the last eight.

Anastasia, had

RES

featured in her first Women's Series final since October 2021, producing her best performance in her semi-final demolition of De Graaf.

The former World Champion backed up her run and has risen to No.9 in the rankings and is closing in a top 8 finish.

It was four-time Women's World Champion Lisa Ashton who had enjoyed a day of all round success during the Saturday in Wigan.

Mikuru Suzuki and Ashton celebrated PDC Women's Series titles during a dramatic double-header on Saturday.

Suzuki kicked off the fifth weekend of 2023 Women's Series action with victory in Event 17 at the Robin Park Tennis Centre, sweeping aside Ashton to clinch her third title of the campaign.

However, Ashton made amends with Event 18 success, whitewashing Anastasia Dobromyslova to celebrate her 15th Women's Series crown, and her first since June 2022.

Twice Lakeside champion
Suzuki remains poised
to seal her World
Championship return in
December, after reeling
off four straight legs to

dispatch Ashton in Event 17 and cement second spot on the Women's Series Order of Merit.

Suzuki and Sherrock currently occupy the next two provisional qualification places, with Suzuki also poised to book her Grand Slam of Darts return in November.

The Robin Park Tennis Centre will play host to Events 21-24 on October 14-15, with coverage streamed live on *PDCTV* from 1000 BST on each day.

The top two non-qualified players from the final PDC Women's Series Order of Merit will qualify for the 2023/24 World Darts Championship, with current leader Greaves assured of qualification following her Women's World Matchplay exploits.

NCE-upon-a-time your lower ranked tour player was virtually made redundant every summer. July to September were exciting times if you had qualified for The World Matchplay or were travelling to one of a handful of affiliated events outside the UK. Time shave changed:

As this issue of DWE is published the 24th Players Championship (PC) of 2023 will be coming to a close. Since our last 'On Tour' look, at the end of June, at the Pro Tour the number of events held during the summer will have reached double figures.

With the announcement that all these events will be midweek from 2024 onwards the timetable for full time year-round professional players is clearer than ever.

A glance at the current Super 8 reveals the superb spell being enjoyed by Dave Chisnall. The resurgent *Chizzy* tops the list having just added PC23 to his hat-trick of 2023 European Tour titles. It's no surprise that Luke Humphries is hot on heels.



Remarkably, *Cool Hand* has been *Chizzy's* victim in each of the four finals won by the St Helens man.

These two also sum up the ongoing battle between generations that is especially visible on this year's Pro Tour.

If we classify those such as Gerwyn Price, Jonny Clayton, Rob Cross and Chisnall himself as part of a generation that really established itself in the 20-teens and are the reigning stars, and Humphries, Heta and DVD as the representative the group that has been knocking on the door to be the next household names, with Josh Rock as the semi-regular sensational new prodigy then its clear just how intense the battle away from the TV cameras is.

Out of the ten previously mentioned PCs only Gerwyn Price has really asserted the superstars dominance at the floor level:

Luke Humphries (2) Damon Heta, Gerwyn Price (3), Danny Noppert, Dave Chisnall, Callan Rydz with PC 24 yet to be decided.

None for World Champion Michael Smith nor Premier League Champion MVG nor World Matchplay Champ Nathan Aspinall.

Some of this is of course down to

Some of this is of course down to scheduling and choices of what to play and when. However, Price's ability to



maintain a hefty dominance over his fellow professionals demonstrates what is becoming a rarer ability to boss both of what are effectively becoming two different games.

During the development of the Pro Tour there have always been rare players who excelled away from stages/TV cameras and under achieved under the lights.

Mark Walsh was followed by Ian White as players who could win multiple Pro Tour events and compete with the very



best head-to-head – Walsh battled Taylor valiantly around 2010-2012 – but didn't really show their absolute best, certainly not often enough, in those ranking majors. There seem to be a few candidates to take the baton from Diamond White, Heta has won multiple PCs and not yet truly shone – playing wise – on the biggest stage.

However, not only is there divergence between players who can rise high in the rankings, as their careers develop, based on their off-camera efforts, but only pocket early round major prize money. There is also a new group.


There are a group of players who have been around the higher level for a decade or more and have vast experience throughout our sport. They are no longer at their absolute best and are perhaps struggling on the biggest day or against the top ranked players if they are firing. But these guys know how to play, how to time their effort and how to gain every penny possible from the 'floor events'.

Thus a group of players who previously would have faded quite quickly, and moved to legend exhibitions, media work or simply retired, are instead able to remain on the tour, collect decent prize money and even qualify for the biggest events in the hope of another great day or an Indian summer.



Perhaps the best example has been Brendan Dolan. The genial Irishman has reached three ProTour semi-finals, a quarter final and a hatful of last 16 places this year. It enabled him to qualify for almost all the big events and he is ranked inside the top 30 on the Pro Tour and main Orders of Merit.

For those who enjoy watching emerging trends or interesting developments in our game, the three pronged development of the Pro Tour, Dominant names, breakthrough stars and journeymen pros, may provide much material in coming months and years and may even force changes to prevent stagnation.





BUSY BEAST REMAINS NO.1

The biggest news regarding the WDF since last publication may well have been an off-the-oche one, but it hasn't stopped a stream of events on it.

As was well documented, the decision of the PDC to restrict entry to its World Championship to any players competing in the forthcoming WDF World Championship proved a blow to the event.

It already looks set to rule out Luke Littler and will provide a dilemma for the top women's players as they approach qualification for the Ally Pally and face a question of prioritisation.

Picking up where we last left off in August, the Australian Darts Open did not disappoint.

Lisa Ashton followed on from successes



in the Pacific Masters to win what was the following week's event, an 8-4 final victory over Aileen de Graaf getting her over the line.

The men's event was meanwhile captured by Andy Baetens, the world number 1 who looks in fine fettle as the Lakeside approaches.

Elsewhere, the Swedish Open and Masters delivered another pair of wins for Beau Greaves in the ladies field. She defeated Deta Hedman and Kirsi Viinikainen in the respective finals.

The men's Open was won by Thomas Junghans, who defeated Darren Johnson in the final. The men's Masters was however taken by Berry van Peer, who followed up his Dutch Open title earlier this year with a win in Scandinavia.

Into September we go and in Finland, there was a first WDF title in over a decade for Johan Engström at the Finnish Open.

He was joined in the winners' circle by the aforementioned Viinikainen in the women's.

September's show prize however once again proved to be the British Open and Masters, taking place by the coast in Bridlington.

In the Classic, Deta Hedman took home a third WDF title of the year, getting the better of Aletta Wajer.

An outstanding 105 average in the men's final helped Luke Littler home to the Classic win, soon followed up with an Open title after slaying Peter Jacques in that final.

The women's Open was won by the Welsh international Eve Watson, who in victory takes her first WDF tournament.

She will hope to build on an impressive weekend in East Yorkshire, which also

saw her make the semi-final of the British Classic.

The WDF has been a happy hunting ground for Matt Edgar this year and that continued in Slovenia as he won the Masters title.

Amongst the last month's winners also include: Raymond van den Ende (Catalonia Open men's), Anna Forsmark (Catalonia Open women's), Stowe Buntz (Washington Area Open men's), Paula Murphy (Washington Area Open women's), Alan Skayman (Auckland Open men's), Nicole Regnaud (Auckland Open women's), Dave Marshall (North Queensland Classic men's), Kathleen Martin (North Queensland Classic women's), Leonard Gates (Witch City Open men's), Cali West (Witch City Open women's), Nic Southorn (Taranaki Open men's), Desi Mercer (Taranaki Open women's), Jelle Klaasen (FCD Anniversary Open men's), Patricia De Peuter (FCD

Anniversary Open women's), Matt Mullen (Murray Bridge Classic men's) and Kym Mitchell (Murray Bridge Classic women's).

Attention now turns to the World Cup in Denmark, before another busy and globetrotting month of October in the lead-up to the World Championship.



Austrian Family's Tungsten Fascination

he brothers Rodriguez were born in Vienna, Austria to Filipino parents named Sonny and Cecilia. All 4 have the initials RJR and their unconventional names have helped them become fan favourites. Roxy-James is the oldest and the first to take up darts. He is less active nowadays as he mostly plays in

> home nation events. Roxy was the first brother to appear in a major as he qualified for the 2012 BDO World Masters.

The 31-year-old known as the 'chainsaw' or RJR1 was the first brother to pick up darts. He accompanied his father Sonny to many tournaments in and around Vienna and Rowby sometimes joined them as well and this is how he got into darts.

Roxy-James has appeared in the BDO/ WDF World Masters on three occasions, in 2012,2013 and 2022. His best result came in the 2012 edition where he reached the L80.

He has appeared on the PDC Euro Tour on numerous occasions the first of which came in 2016 at the Austrian Darts Open which was the last Euro Tour title for Phil Taylor. Roxy-James lost out to Nigel Heydon in the first round by 6 legs to 4. He next played in the 2017 edition which was remarkable because Rowby-John and Rusty-Jake also qualified which meant all 3 brothers played in the same tournament which was the first and so far only such occurrence.

He had a superb year last year
and won over many fans.

Rowby is a beloved character and is known for his energetic on-stage presence and his popular walk on to the tune of Vamos a la playa. He is well known for his pause after he hits two T20s as he hypes the crowd up before he goes for the maximum.

Rowby-John first rose to prominence in 2010 after he won the Austrian National Championship as a 16-year-old.

Then he claimed a first senior title in the BDO/WDF as he won the 2011 Carinthian Open with a victory over well-known Karel Sedlacek.

He won a second Senior title the next year as he won the Baltic Cup Open with a 4-0 Win over fan favourite Madars Razma. He also won the youth Dutch Open with a convincing win over Dimitri Van Den Bergh.

He has also claimed three youth and development tour titles in 2013, 2015 and 2018. And a challenge tour in 2021.

Rusty-Jake

Rusty is the youngest of the brothers to play darts and despite being only 16 he has picked up numerous titles in his career.

His first title came at the 2015 Austrian Open Youth tournament when he beat the Hungarian György Vöröshávi to claim his first ranking title at just 15 years old.

He would go on to beat future prospect Wessel Njiman to win the Czech Open youth to cap off a fine 2015 for the rising star. Rusty-Jake

The next few years were mostly quiet for Rusty as he didn't win any titles until 2021. This year however was a spectacular year for the young Austrian.

Covid meant the PDC development tour was split into two, with a European version and a UK version. Rusty won 5 of the 12 titles on offer and had a lead of nearly £6000 over the second ranked Fabian Schmutzler.

He also had a good year on the tour and this meant he qualified for the Worlds regardless of his Development tour achievements.
